

New Master of Science in Global Studies Program

CGS Announces Launch of New Master of Science in Global Studies Program, Spring 2026!

The Center for Global Studies (CGS) is thrilled to announce the launch of a new Master of Science in Global Studies (MSGS) program, beginning in Spring 2026. This innovative, interdisciplinary program is a collaborative effort among the Center for Global Studies (CGS), the Center for the Study of Global Gender Equity (CSGGE), and the Program in Arms Control & Domestic and International Security (ACDIS).

The MSGS program offers three distinct tracks: Global Governance, Global Security, and *Gender and Public Policy*. This structure capitalizes on the teamwork and scholarly synergies across the campus, offering a wide range of courses from throughout the university, and providing new educational pathways across disciplines. The aim is to develop broadly educated and well-trained scholars, practitioners, and professionals who will become future leaders with a global impact.

Designed to be completed in three semesters, the program offers flexibility through online and in-person courses, accommodating the diverse needs of full-time students and working professionals, regardless of their location around the globe or on the Urbana-Champaign campus.

The MSGS program emphasizes real-world, professional training and experience by equipping students with the skills to study, research, and work globally and with international universities and industry partners. Graduates will gain valuable global skills such as international teamwork, communication, and collaboration, which are increasingly in demand in today's interconnected world.

Graduates of the program will have a strong understanding of globalization and the framework of Global Studies. They will develop critical thinking skills to analyze how globalization impacts global order, welfare, and legitimacy, and translate classroom knowledge into professional experience by exploring global studies phenomena and problems.

The Illinois Global Institute's ACDIS, CGS, and CSGGE are committed to preparing students for successful careers in an increasingly interconnected world. The new Master's degree program is a testament to that commitment.

Margie Giacalone is a PhD Student in the Department of Anthropology. Their research examines the multilingual strategies that gender and sexually dissident Indigenous and descendant Bolivians enact for a politics of care in a changing social, political, and economic landscape.



Barbara A. Yates Fellow

Asmaa Elsayed is a PhD Student in the Department of Education Policy, Organization, and Leadership at the College of Education. Asmaa's research explores how Gen Z and Alpha minoritized women activists in Egypt use digital technologies to access forbidden knowledge, reshape identities, build social capital, and engage in activism, redefining 'place' and 'belonging' across digital and physical realms.



Evelyne Accad and Paul Vieille International Research Awardee Mahbubeh Moqadam is a PhD Student in the Department of Sociology. Mahbubeh's research examines how Daheye Hashtadi (Iran's Generation Z) women navigate digital spaces and sociopolitical constraints before, within, and after the Woman-Life-Freedom movement. Using digital ethnography and content analysis her research investigates their identity formation, mobilization

strategies, and intersectional resistance in online/offline landscapes.



Evelyne Accad and Paul Vieille International Research Awardee Aysenur Senel is a PhD Student in the Department of Architecture. Aysenur's research examines the intersection of gender, race, class, ethnicity and imperial authority in Ottoman architectural patronage, focusing on imperial women in 17th-century Egypt and Istanbul.



Featuring Claire Branigan, Ph.D.

Current Position: Lecturer, Department of Modern and Classical Languages and Literatures, Faculty Affiliate Center for the Study of Women, Gender and Sexuality, Faculty Affiliate Center for the Study of Latin America, Rice University.

Location: Houston, TX

What is the focus of your current work and/or research? I currently teach Spanish, Latin American Studies, and Gender Women's Studies at Rice University. My research is focused at the intersection of political/legal, feminist, and medical anthropology. I am interested in the ways that human beings respond to violence, specifically the violence of impunity and violence that is gender-based. I have conducted long-term fieldwork in Argentina on anti-femicide activism and am currently developing a book project that looks at the legacy of family-led activism for justice in Latin America.

How has your GRID minor influenced your career? The GRID minor has had a profound impact on my career. I was actually hired at Rice specifically to teach gender and women's studies courses with a focus on the Global South and a global perspective. The minor has deeply influenced how I approach teaching and how I frame gender for my students, in ways that speak to their diverse interests and experiences.

What advice would you offer to current GRID students? The GRID minor and the CSGGE programing is

unlike any other that I have encountered in higher education. If you are interested in researching anything pertaining to gender, GRID minor will undoubtedly help facilitate this. I found the GRID community to be one of the most supportive. My research was funded by the many funding opportunities and I also found the faculty, students, and staff (Anita) to be incredibly supportive.

- **Lissette Piedra**: Chicago Sun-Times (June 24) A new study led by researchers at the U. of I. found that the depth of social networks that older adults have is linked to their health outcomes. The analysis was led by Illinois social work professor Lissette Piedra, who found three types of social networks emerged among older adults. "Being socially active is connected to brain health," Piedra says. "Being lonely is one of the worst things that you can do for your health, especially as you age."
