## **CLACS Series, Playing Both Sides: Cerro Blanco - Sayan and the Chimú - Inka War**

CLACS presents [Dr. Kasia Szremski](#), research associate (ANTH) and Associate director at the Center for Latin American & Caribbean Studies.

Szremski's lecture will spotlight the archeological work at the Chancay site of Cerro Blanco - Sayan (Perú). Historically dismissed as a minor trade outpost, recent research by University of Illinois students under supervision of Professor Szremski challenges this assumption. Their findings suggest that both the Chimú and Inka empires engaged in

intensive ritual activity at the site. The compelling research poses an important question: Why these two imperial powers were so interested in such an isolated settlement? Join Dr. Kasia Szremski for an engaging discussion on the study's key insights and the lasting consequences on global geopolitics.

**The Return of the  
Tupinambá Cloak:

The return of the Tupinambá cloak to Brazil in 2024 marked one of the year's most significant cultural events. Crafted in the mid-17th century and long housed at the National Museum of Denmark, the cloak embodies the diplomatic strategies of Indigenous peoples in northeastern Brazil, who used such objects to establish alliances with Europeans. Its repatriation now resonates with struggles for land demarcation, debates over ethnic identity, and broader discussions on the role of Indigeneity in shaping Brazil. This talk examines the cloak's return and the questions it raises about Indigenous identity, cultural repatriation, and historical memory.

Elisa Frühauf Garcia is a professor of history at the Universidade Federal Fluminense (UFF). She has held research positions at the State University of Campinas (Unicamp) and the Spanish National Research Council (CSIC) in Madrid. Professor Frühauf Garcia is a CNPq Research Productivity Fellow and Paper Scientist. Her first of many publications was, *As diversas formas de ser índio: políticas indígenas e políticas indigenistas no extremo sul da América portuguesa*. It received the Prêmio Arquivo Nacional de Pesquisa. The book was published by the Arquivo Nacional itself. Other institutions that supported her work include the Fundação Carolina, the Newberry Library, and the Max Planck Institute for Legal History. Additionally, she has been a visiting professor at the State University of Feira de Santana in Bahia, funded by CAPES. An expert on the indigenous people of Brazil, her current research focuses on the relationships between Native women and European men in the sixteenth and early seventeenth centuries. By adopting a long term perspective, her work bridges history, cultural heritage, and the diverse ways in which the early colonial past is interpreted and utilized.

**Speaker: Elisa Frühauf Garcia, the Lemann Center's Distinguished Visiting Scholar and a Professor of History at the Universidade Federal Fluminense (UFF)**

The Lemann Center for Brazilian Studies present the Lemann Lecture series, where Professor Elisa Frühauf Garcia will discuss [The Return of the Tupinambá Cloak: Indigenous Art, Memory, and Politics](#). In 2024, the Tupinambá cloak was returned to Brazil from Denmark, marking a major cultural event. Originally made in the 17th century, the cloak reflects how Indigenous peoples used such items to form alliances with Europeans. Its return highlights ongoing issues around Indigenous identity, land rights, and cultural heritage in Brazil. The talk will explore these themes, led by Elisa Frühauf Garcia, a historian and expert on Indigenous peoples of Brazil. Her research connects

colonial history with modern debates about identity and cultural memory.

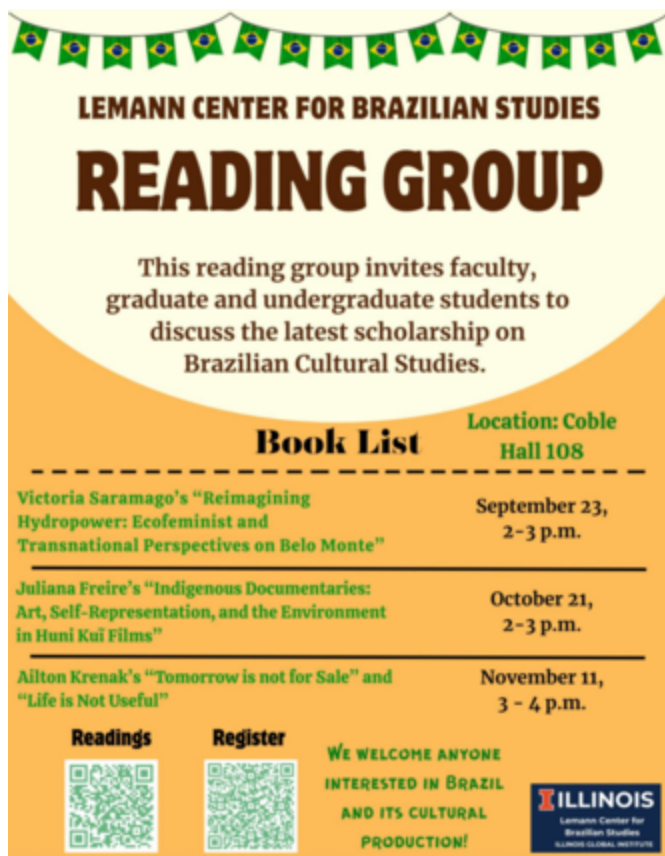

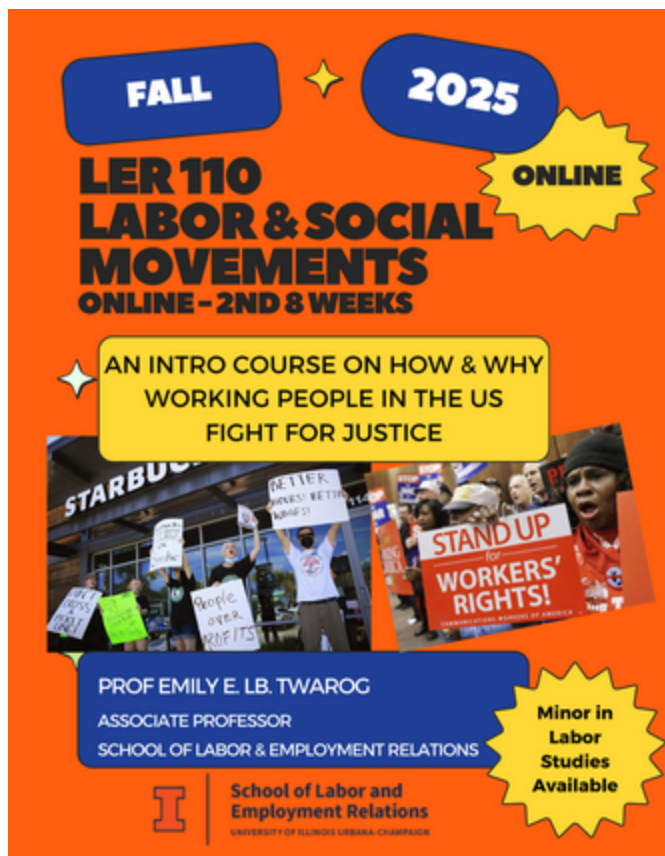
