Women in Science Lecture Series Fall 2025



Course description: Students in this course acquire the theoretical and empirical skills required for understanding, evaluating, and critiquing development programs and policies. The core focus is on the gendered dimensions of such programs and policies. Theoretical skills are acquired through comparative

analyses of competing models of development such as the capability approach, dependency theory, and neo-liberal theory. Empirical skills are built by critically evaluating national and international programs and policies related to education, health, nutrition, and agriculture as well as access to economic resources and the means of production. **This course will be led by Professor Fogelman, C.**

GLBL 296: Global Studies Foundation Seminar

The LAS Global Studies program requests proposals for **one-credit undergraduate seminars** that introduce a problem or challenge confronting societies today and engage students in initial research and discussion on pathways to address the issue. The seminars should promote interdisciplinary thinking and a perspective that has global scope.

These seminars help Global Studies majors define their thematic areas and attract students from across disciplines. Instructors, ranging from faculty and academic professional to advanced graduate students, gain valuable experience teaching innovative, globally focused courses. This seminar is also accessible to students with no pre-requisite coursework. GLBL 296 courses are half-semester, 1-credit courses offered on campus.

GLBL 298: Global Studies Seminar Abroad

The LAS Global Studies program invites proposals to Global Studies Seminar Abroad (GSSA). These seminars abroad are special topics courses designed by faculty to enhance undergraduate students' understanding of a topic or problem of global import through an on-campus course that extends into a field experience abroad with an applied focus. If your proposal is accepted, you will work with LAS International Programs to craft a full course abroad proposal for review by the College and by International Safety and Security. Given conditions at the time of this RFP all programs are tentative pending clearance for study abroad experiences from campus.

GLBL 298 short courses abroad require campus approval for travel to the destination. All GLBL 298 proposal will be reviewed by the campus International Safety and Security committee before final approval. You will work with the LAS Abroad office to complete the budget and travel details.
